"Baptism, Confirmation and Church Membership"

On April 19th new members were taken into church membership. On May 17th, through confirmation, another class of young adults will become church members. These are special days in the life of the congregation. Perhaps a little understanding of these activities would be helpful.

<u>Baptism</u> -- Throughout the year we practice baptism in the local church. In the UMC people of all ages, most especially infants and children are brought forward for baptism because we believe it is first about who God is, what God has done, and what God will continue to do in the life of the child. In baptism, parents and congregation promise to nurture the child as he or she grows in grace. We only baptize once and we recognize and celebrate the baptism of other faiths. In baptism, a journey is begun. The journey is a gift initiated by God. It is a journey that is not meant to be traveled alone, but nurtured by parents and the community of faith.

<u>Confirmation</u> — The process of confirmation flows out of United Methodist theology that emphasizes the need for repentance, justifying grace, and conversion. Confirmation ties together God's act in Christ and our response in faith.

Confirmation is an act of the Holy Spirit by which we ask the Holy Spirit to work in us, helping us to be disciples. During confirmation we give thanks for and confirm what God has already done in baptism, and what God is doing within us in particular. We pray over each person confirmed, "...the Lord defend you with his heavenly grace and his Spirit confirm you in the faith and fellowship as all true disciples of Jesus Christ."

Like most United Methodist congregations, our preparation for confirmation begins when youth enter 7th grade or later. This is the age when young people begin to move from concrete thinking to abstract thinking and is when many people begin to make lifelong faith decisions. During these middle school/junior high years, youth are seeking a sense of belonging. Belonging to the community of faith is an appropriate response to that developmental task. Formal confirmation classes begin in the fall and last through most of the school year. Upon personal interviews with the pastors and youth director, if deemed ready, they will be confirmed.

<u>Church Membership</u> — A pastor and church can urge that anyone wishing to become a member participate in an orientation to the new local church. In the Mentor UMC, adults prepare for baptism and membership in small group settings called "The Basics." These adult classes focus on fundaments of faith, the history and beliefs of The United Methodist Church and local church history/workings.

When anyone becomes a professing member of a local church, he or she is a professing member of The United Methodist Church and of the universal church of Jesus Christ. No further ritual action is required, except for reception in the local church pledging to support it with their prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness.

Why should I be a member? That's a good question. It is important to answer that question with a clear understanding that membership is not a privilege as much as it is a responsibility. Yes, membership does offer opportunities to serve in committee leadership and vote on important issues. But membership brings responsibility. For one, members are called to serve, not be served. With membership we relinquish some privileges, e.g. visitor parking. Membership brings a new level of expectation. Faithful discipleship includes the obligation to participate in the corporate life of the congregation with fellow members of the body of Christ. Membership steps this up by calling us to the sacred covenant to shoulder the burdens, share the risks, and celebrate the joys of fellow members.

As we celebrate, and continue to celebrate these special days, we give thanks to God for the gift of those who enter into baptism and church membership.

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Drywall finishing is complete, with only small clean-up areas remaining. Wall priming is completed and finish painting has begun. The drop ceiling grid is being

installed. Roofing, plumbing, and electrical subcontractors continue to make progress.

HVAC work and light fixture installation will be completed when the ceiling grids are installed. Casework and flooring have been ordered with delivery at various times in May and June. Much of the work should be completed in May, but occupancy will be determined by the completion of the whole job. The project time projections estimate the completion of the Education Wing by May 1. June 1 is the projection for the east entrance/nursery/toddler space. The rest is projected by July.

Please note the date of May 2nd for spreading top soil. We are seeking volunteers to assist in this work (check out the special announcement in this newsletter for more information).

Careful monitoring of construction costs continue.

THROUGH THE YEARS

Most ministers in the United Methodist Church pursue one of two career paths. They are either Elders or Deacons. Unlike the terms that are used in other denominations, United Methodist elders and deacons are ordained clergy with a lifetime service of ministry. An elder is called to the ministry of Word, sacrament, and order. They are typically appointed to administer the life of the local church. They are ordained to share the two sacraments of the United Methodist Church, baptism and holy communion. Elders must have a Master's of Divinity degree from an approved seminary. They are itinerant, meaning they can be moved from church to church within the conference by the Bishop. Their main responsibility is preaching.

Deacons often have a Master's of Divinity degree but could have a Master's in another field. They are called to the ministry of Word and to service. Deacons assist with the sacraments. Deacons are often called to a specialized area of ministry such as counseling, youth, education, missions, or chaplaincy. They are not itinerant and find their own place of employment and are then appointed there by the Bishop.

Following graduation, both Elders and Deacons come before a conference board to be approved for provisional status. After two years, provisional clergy go back before the conference board to be approved for full ordination. They are ordained at Annual Conference and are then considered in "full connection" with the church. Elders and Deacons are members of the conference they belong to and are not members of the local church they serve.

There is a third category of United Methodist clergy, it is Licensed Local Pastor. They are appointed by the bishop to serve a specific church. The LLP can perform the sacraments at that local church only. The status for local pastor must be renewed each year by the District Committee on Ministry and the bishop's appointment. They must go through a licensing school and have twelve years to complete a course of study, or be a seminary graduate. Elders, Deacons, and LLP can all perform marriages and funerals.

Pastor Kurt Landerholm is an Elder. Pastors Beverly Wrobel and Kathy Dickriede are Deacons. Pastor Jon Wilterdink is a Provisional Elder and Pastor Quincy Wheeler will be commissioned as a Provisional Elder at Annual Conference in June. A key distinction between an Elder and Deacon is their stoles. An Elder wears a stole around the neck that hangs straight. They Deacon wears a stole (sash) at an angle off the left shoulder. Provisional members (Elder or Deacon) do not wear stoles until they are fully ordained. We are certainly thankful for all the effort and dedication these servants of God bring to our church.
