#### From the Pastor

December 3 marks the first Sunday in Advent. The last day, Sunday, will be December 24. Advent comes from a Latin word meaning "coming" or "visit." During Advent, we prepare for, and anticipate, the coming of Christ. We remember the longing of Jews for a Messiah and our own longing for, and need of, forgiveness, salvation and a new beginning. Even as we look back and celebrate the birth of Jesus in a humble stable in Bethlehem, we also look forward, anticipating the second coming of Christ as the fulfillment of all that was promised by his first coming.

During this 22 day season I encourage you to read the scriptures related to the birth of Jesus. I have put together a reading schedule for each day of the season. Take some time to read the daily passage asking these 3 questions:

- 1. What does it tell us about God?
- 2. What does this say about us human beings?
- 3. What has God done about this and what does he expect of us?

Perhaps you can do this as a family using an easy to read translation, e.g. the "New Living Translation." Whether alone or with others, seek to make this a practice during this special season.



#### Through The Years - Traditions and Customs

The Christmas season brings with it all the traditions and customs we love at this time of year. There are so many of them associated with the season that there is not room to discuss them all. Here are a few with historical and/or religious significance.

- 1. Merry Christmas versus Happy Christmas While there are some (particularly in the United Kingdom) who say Happy Christmas, Merry Christmas is by far the more common. Credit for this term is usually given to Sir Henry Cole, an Englishman, who designed the first commercial Christmas Card in 1843. It said "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year".
- 2. Figgie Pudding This tasty treat mentioned in the carol, "We Wish You a Merry Christmas", came from the West country of England. The pudding can be made with figs, raisins or plums.
- 3. Holly and Ivy These plants carry religious messages. The holly leaves are prickly signifying the Crown of Thorns that Christ wore when crucified. The red berries signify His blood. Ivy is a plant that must cling to something to grow. This reminds us to cling to God to support our lives.
- 4. December 25 as Christmas Day The Emperor Constantine, the first Christian emperor, decreed that this date would celebrate Christ's birth in 366 AD. There are different theories why this date was selected, but some believe it is because it is nine months after the Annunciation which is celebrated on March 25.
- 5. Christmas Carols The first recorded Christmas carol was in the year 129 AD when a Roman Bishop said a song called "Angels Hymn" should be sung commemorating Christ's birth. Through the middle ages most carols were composed in Latin and the public paid them little attention. However, in Victorian England, many old songs dealing with Christmas were cataloged. Many of the carols we love today were also composed during this period.
- 6. Christmas is Universal. The term Merry Christmas is spoken around the world, reflecting the universal message that Christ is our Savior. Here is a sample:

Swahili - Krismasi Niema Bulgarian - Vesela Koleda Sanskrit - Krismasasva shubhkaamnaa Swedish - God Jul Hawaiian - Mele Kalikimaka Navajo - Nizhonigo Keshnish

Whatever traditions or languages are used, the message is the same - Christ is Born! Merry Christmas to you all!
