From the Pastor

The United Methodist Church and Human Sexuality

2018 marks the 50th anniversary of the founding of the United Methodist Church with the union of the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren (EUB) Churches. Part of the constitution of the denomination called for a General Conference of Methodist churches from around the world every four years. This body is the only one that can make modifications to the Book of Discipline (rule book).

After the organizing conference in 1968, they gathered in 1972 and passed a motion affirming the worth of homosexuals but also stated that we (the UMC) do not condone the practice.

Through the 50-year history, at each of the four-year stops at General Conference, this language has been challenged, but always upheld. Additional action was taken to not allow self-avowed, practicing homosexuals to serve as clergy, nor for celebrations of unity to be performed in our churches or by our clergy.

The United Methodist Church affirms that sexuality is God's good gift to all persons and that all persons are individuals of sacred worth, created in the image of God.

Since first debated in 1972, each General Conference has continued to debate this matter. At the last conference, held in 2016, the matter was tabled in lieu of a special called session in February of 2019 to be held in St. Louis, Missouri. The special session of the General Conference has been called to address a way forward for The United Methodist Church on the matter of human sexuality.

Twelve East Ohio delegates (6 lay and 6 clergy) will attend this Special Session. They recognize the importance of the decisions that will be before them and the impact these decisions will have on each United Methodist church and member. They have issued the following statement, "We invite you to attend and share your thoughts and concerns at one of the five scheduled listening posts that will be held throughout the East Ohio Conference."

Following are the remaining listening posts:

Sat., Sept. 29 from 10:00 am – 12:30 pm at Cambridge Christ UMC Tues., Oct. 9 from 6:30 – 9:00 pm at New Philadelphia First UMC Sat., Oct. 20 from 10:00 am – 12:30 pm at Ashland First UMC Tues., Nov. 6 from 6:30 – 9:00 pm at Aldersgate UMC (North Coast)

They add, "We would appreciate participants registering in advance to help with our planning but registration is not required to attend the posts." To register go to the <u>eocumc.org</u> website.

As we move closer to this historic conference, in addition to attending a listening post, I encourage you to:

• Be in prayer for those who will be delegates at the General Conference.

• Engage in grace-filled conversation in the congregation.

• Remember that our focus continues to be our mission to lead all onto a path of Christ-centered discipleship.

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During this bicentennial year, there have been references to the circuit riders who spread the Methodist faith throughout the United States. Indeed, Mentor Methodist's first pastor, Rev. Ira Eddy, was a circuit rider. But how did the tradition of circuit riding pastors begin and what did they encounter?

The Methodist Episcopal faith in the 1770s had few followers in the United States. While other Protestant denominations, such as the Congregationalists, concentrated their efforts on the established cities of the eastern U.S., the Methodist church decided to spread the faith to everyone. Circuits were established for preachers to cover. John Wesley had started the idea of circuits back in Britain. However, due to the size of the U.S., these American circuits were considerably larger. The westward expansion of the nation also meant that many of these circuits were very wild and rugged.

A typical circuit rider was a young man, usually single, who had received the call to enter the ministry. Many of them did not have a great deal of formal religious training and often had another occupation. Francis Asbury, for example, was also a blacksmith. Many of these circuits could range from 200 to 500 miles. Often a minister would reach a location once every six weeks. This life could be physically demanding. Many circuit riders did not live past their early thirties. They encountered many hardships including exhaustion, illness, animal attacks and unfriendly encounters. They relied on followers for their meals or caught them themselves. They slept at the homes of followers, occasionally at inns, or out in the open. In 1800, a Methodist Circuit Rider made only about one-fifth the income of his Congregationalist counterpart.

The dedication of these pastors and their ability to reach everyday people with their message resulted in an incredible rate of growth for the Methodist Episcopal (as it was known then) faith. From fewer than 1,000 in the 1770s, the church grew to over 200,000 by 1816 and to more than a million in 1844. The Methodist Episcopal Church became the largest religious denomination in the country by the 1820s.

Circuit riding (the term was never officially recognized by the church) ended before the Civil War. But through the efforts of these dedicated men, the word of God reached everyone in the country, no matter where they lived. We owe them a great deal of gratitude.

Partnering with Ohio Guidestone

The satellite offices specifically work with single parent and other disadvantaged families on job interview training, parenting skills, continuing education awareness and access, housing needs and so much more. Ohio Guidestone is just one of the many partners that the Global United Methodist Church is working with to tackle the pervasive struggle families have in poverty.

The Mentor UMC Commission on Missions is exploring ways that our local church can support the mission of Ohio Guidestone in Lake County. Initially we will be educating our congregation on the mission, programs, successes and needs of the Ohio Guidestone office in Painesville. Missions Commission thanks the congregation for its generosity. Flat Rock Homes, Inc. serves 76 individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities in their Care Center, 13 Community Service homes, an Adult Day Program and their new Vocational and Employment program located in Seneca, Erie, Huron and Lorain Counties. Ohio is their mission field. Their residents, participants and families come from 22 counties in Ohio. Every individual that they serve is part of a Medicaid program; however, Medicaid provides only partial funding for their care.

Over the last several years, their Medicaid funding has been reduced by approximately \$340,000, which resulted this summer in a temporary financial shortfall. We heard the plea for help and on August 5 collected a special offering for Flat Rock. With your generosity, we were able to send them a check for over \$900 to continue their work of restoring hope and transforming lives by meeting critical needs and demonstrating Christian values. Thank you!

It is with great pleasure that Rise Against Hunger announced the destination of the meals MUMC packed in May on **Change the World Day.** A shipping container, holding 285,120 meals, has been sent to Swaziland for their partner Adventist Development and Relief Agency. This is an organization that nourishes lives through food assistance and other services in Swaziland, a small country near the southeastern coast of Africa, sandwiched between South Africa and Mozambique, and west across the channel from the southern tip of Madagascar. Rise Against Hunger has distributed 310 million meals in 74 countries worldwide since 2005 and believe with our help, we can end world hunger by 2030.

The Missions Commission has decided to sponsor another meal packing program for Change the World Day next spring. So mark your calendars now for having fun and helping pack meals on Saturday, May 18, 2019. This year, in about two hours, we packed 20,088 meals. We are hoping to increase that amount in 2019, by at least another 10,000 meals, which means we will need to raise over \$9,000. You may begin to contribute to this cause by marking your check: Rise Against Hunger. Every time you purchase a Starbuck's coffee or get a soda or candy bar from a vending machine, remember that many people in the world are hungry. You can set aside some change to address this problem.

Coat Ministry

In the past, hundreds of people have been recipients of donations made to the MUMC Coat Ministry. We begin this year with a zero inventory, as anything that was not taken last year was donated to other Lake County organizations whose purpose, like ours, is to help those in need.

We are in need of new or gently worn warm winter coats...Men, Women, Juniors, Children and Babies. In the past we have found that one of the most needed/hard to find coats are sizes XL, 2XL and 3XL (both men and women). We are also in need of mittens/gloves, hats and scarves.

Donations can be brought to church and placed in the bin at the Community Center marked for Coat Ministry. Monetary donations can also be made to the church, specifically designating funds are for this ministry. Coats will be distributed at our annual Thanksgiving dinner, as well as the holiday food distribution.
