## From the Pastor

"The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told." Luke 2:20

When our babies arrived, the news spread quickly. We called grandparents and aunts and uncles. We called the church office and the "prayer chain" started. With our firstborn, a page in the info book of Riverside Hospital's respiratory therapy breakroom heralded the news. Both births were listed in the East Ohio Conference of the United Methodist Church's newspaper: "East Ohio Today". The internet was not what it is today ... I actually mailed birth announcements to many people.

For Mary and Joseph, as labor pains intensified they frantically searched for a comfortable place to welcome their first baby. However, they had to settle for a manger. There were no trained professionals to help, no comfort of medicine or even a fluffy pillow. The Christ Child was welcomed by a trusting couple and a stall full of animals.

The news spread. Angels sang and shepherds hurried to see. Stars shone - one in particular - and wise man began a long journey towards Bethlehem. Scripture does not mention townspeople gathering or newspaper articles being written. It seems to be the shepherds who return to their lives changed by a little baby's birth. They couldn't stay silent! They sang and glorified God.

Thousands of years later we are still asked to tell the story ... proclaim the birth ... send forth the announcement .... Jesus is born!

What if sharing the news of Jesus' birth was up to you?
In reality - it is!
Will you tell the difference Jesus makes in your life to the world? Will you glorify and praise God with enthusiasm; with a sense of gratitude?
Will you spread the news ... as if the world depended on you for the Good News?

I hope during this Advent and Christmas Season many more will come to know what God has done ... Jesus comes to save ... because of our faithfulness in telling the story. Let's glorify and praise God together, until the whole world knows!

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## Through The Years

It's the Christmas season and it's always interesting to look at some of the holiday traditions that are observed around the world. This year we are taking a trip "downunder".

In Australia, while celebrating many of the activities we do, they also have their own unique slant on Christmas. A popular dessert at this time is Pavlova, named for the Russian ballerina, Anna Pavlova. t is basically a meringue shell with a marshmallow center covered with sweet cream, and fruit oppings. It sounds delicious! Another Aussie Christmas tradition is "Carols by Candlelight". These are large gatherings of people who sing Christmas carols with candle illumination. They draw thousands of people to large parks. The event now includes celebrities and symphony orchestras. The tradition began in Melbourne in 1938 when Norman Banks, an Aussie radio announcer, was waiking home roman sitting roman sitng up it bed lisening Away and the first concert in 1938 . Approximately 10,000 showed up for that frst event. It is now a staple of the holiday season every year. Other cities began their own concerts and now Sydney, Brisbane Perth Adelaide Hobart, Canberra and many others have "Carols by Candlelight", too.

Over in New Zealand, the Poutukawa tree is called the Christmas tree. This is because it produces arge crimson flowers in December and is used as a holiday symbol. While both Christmas and Boxing Day (Dec. 26) are legal holidays in New Zealand, it is interesting to note that no advertising is allowed on television or radio on Christmas day. This rule also applies to Good Friday and Easter Sunday. Auckland, New Zealand's largest city, has a popular Santa Parade down Queen Street. The parade eatures floats and marching bands and is held in late November. (Sounds like their version of the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade.)

One difference with the Australian and New Zealand celebrations is that Christmas occurs in the middle of summer. Quite often a "barbie on the beach" takes the place of our traditional meals Nevertheless, most homes still have trees with decorations. Church attendance skyrockets (sound familiar?).

No matter how Christmas is observed, the important thing is that people around the world celebrate the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. He shall reign forever!

He was a faithful teacher who adapted to changing curriculum and teaching the 3rd \& 4th grade or 5th \& 6th grade depending on where he was needed most. There were even summers where he asked if he was needed. I always tried to give him those three months off as respite.
posted his obituary on my Facebook page to help let people know of his passing and as a way to share about how he impacted them or their children. It was touching to read the comments. I want to share some of them with you.
"Paul was a committed disciple. May God bless him in heaven for his ove of teaching and sharing Jesus with our youth." He truly exemplified being a disciple! "Some of the first Bible verses I memorized were in his 4th grade Sunday school class! He was also the one who really taught us how to use the Bible we'd been gifted the year before as 3rd graders, how to find what we were looking for instead of relying on someone to tell us where to turn."
"I assisted Paul one year as he taught 4th grade Sunday School. Such a quiet gentle man. He amazed me how thoroughly he knew his Scripture." I think Paul really enjoyed teaching the 3rd graders how to use their new bibles. He definitely knew the bible well! "He spent a lot of time preparing his Sunday school lessons. He often brought in photos from his trip to the Holy Land to show the children the places where the Bible stories took place." This was a true gift for his students! "Faithful Servant does not even begin to describe this man. I cannot remember a time when he was not teaching Sunday School at MUMC." Agreed!

Paul also helped with the Heartland services regularly and will be missed by the group that goes here. He was also a regular participant of the Christmas Caroling and would say that spending the time caroling with others was his Christmas. At the funeral, it was interesting to hear from an architect for whom Paul worked. To be able to hear about other areas of his life was fascinating. Paul was definitely a quiet, gentle man who was able to impact many lives. I know that he was able to do that at Mentor UMC through the Children's Ministry. There is definitely a hole in the hallway on Sunday mornings. He was an extraordinary man of God and will be greatly missed. Paul "definitely heard Well done my good and faithful servant' when he met our Lord Jesus.'
