Therefore, I urge you in view of God's mercy, to present your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God – this is your spiritual act of worship.

Do not conform any longer to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is – his good, pleasing and perfect will. Romans 12: 1 - 2

I'm not a morning person. I mean ... I wake up slowly. I like to ease into the day. It takes me a little while to get my motor running – coffee, a walk, a shower. These are helpful in preparing me for the day ahead.

My husband, Tom, is a morning person. He wakes up, gets up, and is ready to face the day. His pattern is different than mine. Part of his pattern is to make and bring me a cup of coffee each morning. He is so sweet! And, maybe knows I need it!

I've always appreciated Paul's advice to the Romans ... his urging! Present yourself to the Lord! This is worship! It will keep you focused on God, not the world! You will know God's will ... God's desire ... God's plan for you!

I think Paul probably meant: do it every day! Whether you're a morning person or not ... whether you're in a joyous or chaotic time of your life ... whether your day ahead looks promising or full of challenges! Present yourself to the Lord!

One of my favorite writers, A.W. Tozer, offers similar insight: With a sacred expectation, I look for God in ALL the circumstances of my day.

Tozer, and the Apostle Paul, trusted that God would show up. In their writings and their witness, they urged others to watch for God, to wait for God, to prepare to receive what God will offer! This seems like a good reminder to all of us as we enter a season of Thanksgiving. As Christ's followers, we know that giving thanks is not confined to a day on the calendar. It is the essential, sacred work of offering ourselves to God every day. Giving thanks that God shows up.

May you offer yourselves to God everyday ... and with sacred expectation give thanks for God's transforming work in you.

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Through The Years

Rev. Peter Cartwright was one of the most interesting and influential Methodist Episcopal preachers of the early nineteenth century. He was a circuit rider who arew to prominence in the church and in politics. He even ran against Abraham Lincoln in two elections.

Peter Cartwright was born in Virginia in 1785 to Peter and Christiana Cartwright. Mr. Cartwright, Sr. had fought in the Revolutionary War. The Cartwrights moved to Kentucky in 1790. Young Peter led a pretty wild life and became quite a gambler. Once, after attending a wedding, he began to feel ill at ease about this life and asked his mother for spiritual help. Christiana, a devout Christian, prayed for him. Peter was so distressed that he thought he was going to die. He promised the Lord that he would turn his life over to Christ if God would help him get over the anxiety he felt. After Cartwright attended a revival meeting in 1801, he decided to become a Methodist. He received an exhorter's license from the church (similar to a Local Pastor today) and was later ordained by Francis Asbury. Rev. Cartwright baptized over 10,000 people and gave over 15,000 sermons. The only books he carried were his Bible, a hymn book, and a copy of the Discipline of the Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1808 he married Frances Gaines. They had two sons and seven daughters. On several occasions, Rev. Cartwright was confronted by rowdies who attempted to interrupt his services. He was not above running them off and challenging them physically.

He moved to Illinois in 1824, wanting to live in a free state. He was opposed to slavery, but disagreed with some of the abolitionist's methods, calling them violent and unchristian. He helped to establish the Illinois General Conference. He founded a church in 1838 and a successor church, which he started in 1857, that still exists today in Pleasant Plains. It is called the Peter Cartwriaht United Methodist Church.

Rev. Cartwright was very active in politics. He was elected to the Illinois Legislature twice. In 1832 Rev. Cartwright, a Democrat, defeated Abraham Lincoln, the Whig candidate (this was prior to Lincoln becoming a Republican) for the legislative position. The two ran against each other in 1846 for Congress and this time Lincoln won. The campaign was difficult and bitter with both candidates taking many verbal swipes at each other (some things never change). However, in 1862, when the Civil War raged, Rev. Cartwright spoke to a group of New Yorkers opposed to Lincoln's presidency. He admonished the group and said that Lincoln was the right man to go forward and lead the country during the national crisis.

Another aspect of Rev. Cartwright's life, which is worth mentioning, is that though he had very little formal education, he helped in establishing three Methodist colleges in Illinois. They are: McKendree University (Lebanon,IL), Illinois Wesleyan University (Bloomington, IL), and MacMurray College (Jacksonville, IL). McKendree is the oldest college in Illinois. Rev. Cartwright died in 1872 and is buried in Pleasant Plains, IL.

I have just spent the past three days at the ETCH Family Ministry Conference. ETCH stands for Equipping the Church and Home. I am so blessed to have had the opportunity to listen to some awesome preachers and speakers, to be part of worship surrounded by other ministry people, and to learn so much from the five breakout sessions. I want to share with you one of the many take-aways that I learned. So, please read on....

When a student graduates from high school, there is a high probability that they will be leaving the church as well. 66% of araduating seniors will not go to church after they have araduated high school. The reason that was given is that these students do not feel connected to people of their church. These students WANT to be connected with the other generations in church.

TRUE healthy family ministry not only includes parents and kids. A healthy family ministry is one where ALL the generations are connected. It is important for the older generation to connect with the students and children of the church. The number one indicator of students staying connected is for them to have spiritual mentors who are not their parents. These are the people who can share their story and the time line of how Jesus has been at work in their lives with the students. These are the people who can help a student remain connected to the church.

Out of the 66% of students who say good-bye to church upon graduation, 31% do return. The number one reason that they return is the influence of their parents! Parents, YOU are your child's MAIN influencer. You are your child's MAIN discipler.

Now, what do we do with this information?! Well, if you are a parent who is wondering how to go about discipling their child and would like some assistance, please contact me! This is why I am here—to equip you, to resource you, and to cheer you on! If you are a person who does not have children or students in their home, how can you become a spiritual mentor to one of our students? do believe that God told His people to repeat the commands to the children in Deuteronomy 6:4-9. It doesn't mention that those children have to live in the same house as the adult who talks about the commands and repeats them. My interpretation is that we are all the family of God, and therefore, we are all responsible in raising up one another to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your strength."

Please sign up for the Positive Parenting Book Club on November 4 from 6:00 to 8:00 pm. The book is Becoming a Spiritually Healthy Family: Avoiding the Six Dysfunctional Parenting Styles by Michelle Anthony. "We all want to guide our children into the abundant life that Jesus offers, but when we pursue the 'more' and 'better' life that the world offers above our pursuit of Jesus, we fall into dangerous and subtle dysfunctional parenting habits." At this time, there are a lot of open spots for you to join me! If you don't have time to read the book, come and hear what the book is about. I would love to have a group that night.

It has been a pleasure to work with our new Director of Youth Ministries, Leah Nash, I hope that you have had the chance to say hello and welcome her and her husband, Chris. Leah and I are working on some different events for students in grades 5-12. You will want to stay tuned for more details.
