Through The Years

I came across a quote in the Plain Dealer recently that I thought was very profound. It read, "The test of courage comes when we are in the minority. The test of tolerance comes when we are in the majority." The quote is from Ralph W. Sockman. I decided to try and learn more about this man who authored such a profound quote.

It turns out Rev. Ralph Washington Sockman was a Methodist Episcopal preacher born in Ohio! 1 also learned that there is much, much more to his life than a single quote. He was born on a farm near Mount Vernon, Ohio, on October 1, 1889. He graduated Phi Beta Kappa from Ohio Wesleyan University in 1911. Rev. Sockman also achieved masters and doctorate degrees from Columbia University. He studied for the ministry at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He married Zellah Endly, the daughter of a Methodist minister, in 1916.

Rev. Sockman became assistant minister at the Madison Avenue Methodist Episcopal Church in Manhattan (New York City) in 1916. A year later, he became the senior minister. Following World War I, he became an advocate for world peace and opposed excessive military spending. He was against censorship believing that one should learn self control rather than have restraints forced upon the individual. A new Methodist Episcopal church in New York, Christ Church, was built in 1931 at the northwest corner of Park Avenue and 60th street. Rev. Sockman became the senior pastor of this new church after the Madison Avenue church was closed. He continued in this role until 1961.

He was best known and gained prominence as the featured speaker on the NBC radio program National Radio Pulpit which ran from 1928-1962. Time Magazine in 1946 called him the number one Protestant radio pastor in the U.S. based upon fan mail (he received 4,000 letters per week). In 1961, Time said he was "generally acknowledged as the best Protestant preacher in the U.S.". Rev. Sockman wrote many books including: Live for Tomorrow, Date with Destiny; A Preamble to Christian Culture and How to Believe, Answering the Questions that Challenge Man's Faith. Two other of his guotes are: "The larger the island of knowledge, the longer the shoreline of wonder" and "Our growth depends not on how many experiences we devour, but how many we digest".

Rev. Sockman died on August 29, 1970. He leaves behind a powerful legacy of Christian thought and strong faith. Generations of the faithful heard him both in church and on the radio. He impacted the lives of many, and through his writings continues to today.

Do you know the definition of DISCIPLESHIP? Do you know that PARENTS (and grandparents, for that matter) are CALLED to DISCIPLE their children (and grandchildren)? As I am looking at the fall and the feeling of starting anew, I am called to remind EVERYONE in my reach that as a parent, God has placed on you this awesome responsibility to disciple your family. It is a daunting task for sure! I will not discredit that in any way, shape, or form.

So, you may be thinking, "OK. I get it. I am supposed to be leading my family in the way of Jesus. But, HOW?" Well, that is where I come in! I am here to COME ALONGSIDE you as YOU disciple your family. First thing is to be in worship regularly! Parents, you can choose to have your child worship alongside of you or have them attend Kids' Journey Groups on Sunday mornings. I leave this up to you to decide what is best for your family. Starting on September 8, our K-2nd Grade, 3rd & 4th Grade, and 5th & 6th Grade groups will be in full swing at both 9 and 11 AM.

Second thing is to be part of a Journey Group with other people who are trying to figure this parenting/discipleship. If you are looking for resources and/or ideas on topics, I would love to offer some to you! If you aren't sure about joining a Journey Group, consider participating in a Positive Parenting event! I will be offering <u>Spiritual Parenting</u> starting September 16 for six sessions. I also have <u>Positive Parenting Book Club</u> dates on the calendar with the books selected. I am currently researching <u>The Talk(s)</u> and when to offer this important study.

Third thing is to share your faith journey within your family! Share the Big God Story, pray together, eat meals together. Be intentional when you are gathered together. It can be around the table, in the car, on the way to practice, or wherever! Just be present with your family. Be honest and open with your family.

As we begin a new school year and have a fresh start, why not begin to disciple your family? Let me know how I can help you on this discipleship journey called parenting! I want to resource you, I want to come alongside you, I want to cheer you on, and, most importantly, I want to celebrate with you!

This series of picture books focuses on children and teaches them valuable life lessons.

This book series is written specifically for children who are in the developmental stages of their lives.
