





"Come and See" John 1:39

John's gospel begins with the words, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." (John 1:1) This is John's way of introducing Jesus. In verse 14 the gospel writer declares, "The Word became flesh and

*lived for a while among us.*" (1:14) That's the incarnation. John then immediately introduces John the Baptist as the one who testifies about the Word that became flesh, Jesus is the Word. A couple of days later John was with two of his disciples. They saw Jesus passing by. John declared, "Look, the Lamb of God!" (1:36) With his announcement, the two disciples followed Jesus, and Jesus turned and looked back, and spoke for the first time in the gospel, "What do you want!" (1:39) The disciples wanted to know where he was staying, and Jesus responded, "Come...and see..." (1:39) They followed Jesus, spent the day with him, and then one of the two, Andrew, went and shared the news with his brother Simon (Peter).

We are all called to be witnesses like John the Baptist and Andrew, and later Peter. We are called to point people to the work of God in Jesus Christ. It is our challenge to share with others what we have seen.

In the book of Acts, the last words of Jesus before ascending into heaven, were a call to be witnesses.

Witnessing to our faith does not always come easy, in fact, most of the time it can be awkward and difficult. But there is an easier way to do so...

Many years ago discussions began around building enhancements. Ideas and dreams were shared. Through the years the ideas met with many detours and problems, but the dream did not die. The dream was about enhancing our facilities for ministry. Eventually the dream took on a design that led toward a positive call to move forward. Financial commitments were made and the dream, though stepped into two phases, moved forward. In June of 2014 the congregation voted to build. Workers began showing up in June and we watched walls drop, parking scraped away, and entrances closed. For over a year we have watched demolition, and then the slow work of construction. Parts of the remodeled areas have opened for ministry; most of the new will be finally completed in July. All along, the purpose of the building enhancements has been to facilitate ministry and mission.

Showing off the building might be one of the easiest ways to witness to our faith. We are planning a "Come and See" event for Sunday, August 30th. We will officially consecrate the work for ministry and mission during our worship services, and then from 12:30—3:00 p.m. we will hold a community open house. Please hold this date on your calendars, and invite your neighbors, friends, and family to "Come and See."

## THROUGH THE YEARS

Recently I had the privilege of interviewing Clarence L. Bowers, oldest child of Clarence H. Bowers, the pastor of our church from 1937 to 1940. It was known then as the Mentor Methodist Episcopal Church. Church membership was around 200. Rev. Bowers came to our church on September 1, 1937. At that time, September was when pastors took their new assignments. Today, July 1 is when United Methodist pastors move to new churches.

Rev. Bowers was born in 1889 in Powhatan Point, Ohio. He earned his divinity degree at Garrett Bible Institue (now Garrett-Evangelical Seminary) located on the campus of Northwestern University. His wife's name was May and they had three children, two boys and a girl. Clarence L., worked at Bailey Controls in Wickliffe for 47 years. Mary Helen was a music teacher and retired as the Supervisor of Music in the Akron School System. Paul, the youngest, is a retired Assistant Pastor of a church in Cleveland, Texas.

Before coming to Mentor, Rev. Bowers was a pastor at many other Methodist churches, including Madison and North Madison in Lake County. He served as pastor for two churches at a time for much of his career. In fact, while at Mentor, he was also pastor at Mentor Plains. The Bowers lived in the church's parsonage at 1627 (now 8627) Mentor Avenue. This address today is home to The Country Pedlar. In 1939 Rev. Bowers traveled to Kansas City, Missouri to witness the convention that merged the Methodist Episcopal, Methodist Episcopal South and the Methodist Protestant Churches into the Methodist Church.

Rev. Bowers had strong youth programs and would take the youth to Lakeside Institute each year. He also produced religious dramas annually at Easter.

Rev. Bowers left Mentor and moved to Lorain in 1940. He served at several other churches, including the Jefferson Methodist Church. There, his MYF group included the Haines boys, Jacque and Jim and the Anderson girls, Carol and Mary Lou. Yes, the brothers married the sisters and Mentor UMC has been enriched due to their presence.

Rev. Bowers was in the ministry for fifty-five and a half years. His last assignment came after he had "retired", when he was asked by the Conference to begin a church in Northampton Township, near Cuyahoga Falls. Today this church, Northampton United Methodist Church, is a large and flourishing church in the East Ohio Conference.

Rev. Bowers died in 1977. He served his flock well at Mentor Methodist. He is one of the many great stories regarding the pastors who have served our church so well for nearly 200 years. Next time you walk past the photos of previous Mentor pastors, please give Rev. Bowers a look and say thank you!

I have a fantastic girlfriend named Mckinsie who has been the major catalyst in me pursuing my calling to the ministry.




