My first pastoral appointment was to a two-point charge on the banks of the Ohio River upstream from Marietta, Ohio. The community was on the edge of a national forest and the beauty of the region was framed against the contrast of the rugged hills and the winding river. For ten years we made that place home, and the birthplace of our three children.

In an area of economic decline and struggling families, there were many challenges for ministry. Despite the challenges, we experienced some exciting times of ministry. Reports of what was happening caught the attention of a consortium of organizations committed to improving the life of Appalachia. I was asked to write an article sharing the source of this "bright spot" in a difficult place.

The article was published in a booklet entitled, "Signs of Hope in Appalachia." It's been a couple decades ago, but I remember writing about several keys of our success, and one was the gift of financial stability. What was mentioned in passing in the article I share in more detail.

Toward the end of the 19th century and into the early 20th century it was not uncommon for churches to struggle to pay their meager salary to the "preacher" (as they were known in the area). One dear lady would go door to door of church members soliciting funds to make payroll. This left an impact on her son. He had a successful career and invested conservatively in the stock market. When he and his wife decided to prepare their will, they included the church.

One day we were notified of his death and the naming of the church in his will. When the estate was settled, the church's share was nearly half a million. The funds were invested, and only the interest available. The church leadership determined that the funds should be used to fuel ministry and mission in the church.

The fruit of that permanent endowment to the church reaped many benefits. It provided a base for ministry that otherwise may not have occurred. Those funds helped free the church from "we can't afford" thinking to support thriving ministries and outreach.

Since beginning my appointment to Mentor, I have seen this blessing repeated many times through the planned giving people have made that includes this church in their estate. Once again, ministry and mission has been, and continues to be, funded on a perpetual basis. What a gift this has been and will continue to be!

---- THROUGH THE YEARS ----

The Archives of Ohio United Methodism is located on the campus of Ohio Wesleyan University In Delaware, Ohio. Since 1839, the Methodist Episcopal Church in Ohio recognized the need to record important documents from the founding of the faith. The original location was Cincinnati. The archives were moved to Ohio Wesleyan in 1851. Housed in the Beeghly Library, the collections include books about United Methodism in general, as well as manuscripts and conference proceedings relevant to the history of United Methodism in Ohio.

Other documents include artifacts and photos that depict the history of our faith. One of the very interesting records the archives contains are files on the history of local churches. In fact, at the end of 2014, I completed, with the help of Joan Sadler, a form that documented Mentor Methodist's history. I hope to travel to Delaware to see what other history they have about our church.

There is much more information housed at the archives, including newspapers, journals, personal papers, and diaries. Information on the Evangelical United Brethren Church is also included. The EUB church and the Methodist church merged in 1968 to form the United Methodist Church.

2016 Annual Operating Budget/3 Year Commitment for In tHis House Building Enhancements

Each year we have the opportunity to make a commitment toward the next year's operating budget. This allows the church to plan a budget and move into the year with a strong estimate of giving. This Fall we will be given that opportunity once again.

This year, like 2012, we will also include a 3 year campaign for capital improvements. In the Fall of 2012 we were challenged toward support of a campaign to support building enhancements. Commitments were made with a 36 month pay in opportunity. In the early summer of 2014 we voted to begin construction on Phase I of planned enhancements. The construction is winding down, but the time has come to make another three year commitment toward paying for those building enhancements.

We have been blessed with personal resources, and the church has been entrusted with building resources. Our call is to be and make disciples; we do so through the ministry and mission of the congregation. Through our annual budget and the continued support of the building enhancements, we live into that call.

Our goal is simple:

- 1. Support the mission of the church through our support of the annual budget.
- 2. Commitments for payment for our building enhancements over a three year period.

For your information note the following Q & A:

We've heard of construction overruns, why and how much were they?

The construction costs increased by 37%, due primarily to unforeseen issues associated with adding to existing structures built in 3 stages dating back to 1956, as well as code changes. With a budgeted contingency of 10%, careful management of funds, and a higher than anticipated debt, these costs are covered.

What was not completed?

All work has been completed, or is nearing completion. To manage funds we did not spend anticipated funds on furnishings. In addition, through volunteer labor we performed landscaping and some interior work.

What is the debt on the new construction?

We are expecting the final bank loan to be \$2.1 million with a monthly mortgage payment of \$14,149.00. In addition, we borrowed an additional \$300,000 from GEM.

Will there be more construction?

The plan is to pay off the present debt, then begin addressing Phase II of new construction. This is the long-term plan.

What is the size of the church operating budget?

While the final figures are not complete for the 2016 operating budget, it is coming in near the \$1 million mark. This is consistent with the past two years.
