HYMN OF MISSION "Amazing Grace" UMH 378

Hymn History: The words to this hymn were written by John Newton. He was born in London, England in 1725. His réligious mother died when he was six and John had a difficult childhood. He joined a merchant ship at age eleven. He was later pressed (forced) into the Royal Navy. He fell in love with Mary "Polly" Catlett and left his ship to see her. He was subsequently flogged and traded to a merchant ship. He became the captain of a slave trading ship. He nearly drowned during one difficult voyage and this was the beginning of his conversion to Christianity. He married Polly and eventually left the slave trade. He became, with the encouragement of John Wesley, a Church of England Cleric. The words to Amazing Grace were originally a poem Newton wrote and read to his congregation on New Year's Day, 1773. These words reflected his own regretful past. William Walker set Newton's poem to music in 1835 using the tune NEW BRITAIN. Newton became a leader in the abolitionist movement in England. He worked with William Wilberforce, a member of the British Parliament, to pass the Slave Trade Act of 1807 which abolished slave trade in Great Britain, Newton died months later in 1807.


